
In the beginning . . .

.... there was a Youth club, at Broughton Village, which had been disbanded. Mr Gordon Spicer and 20 year old Arthur Kidd collected the youth club's footballers together called them Fulwood and Broughton Amateurs FC and played a few 'friendlies'. The year was 1947.

Mr. Arthur Dickinson, a local business man, was instituted as founder President (he held the office for 18 years till 1965) he with Gordon Spicer (Chairman from 1947 - 58) and Harry Lawton played prominent roles in establishing, organising and guiding the club.

Other known founder members were Norman Archer, Peter Haywood, Harry Foster, Alec White and Arthur Cook. Mr. Frank Mitchell 'looked after' the Team.

The newly formed organisation wasted no time in progressing. They applied for, and were granted, playing membership of the Preston and District League. Two teams were entered in the 1947-48 season with the nucleus of players being ex-Broughton Youth Club members.




At the end of the 1949-50 season the club left the District League after being accepted into membership of the Lancashire Amateur League. The name of the club had to be changed because Fulwood were already playing in the league so the club now, and for ever, became BROUGHTON AMATEURS.

This was a definite step up in level of football, from Local to County standard and Broughton were warned "You will never make the grade, the football is too fast."

After the first season (1950-51) there must have been worries that the warnings were well founded, as the team finished bottom of the league, and had to apply for re-election.

They re-entered the competition in 1951-52 with added determination. The hard working committee, had busily been laying the foundations behind the scenes, and this vigour transmitted itself onto the pitch as the players, led by inspirational captain Hayden Sigley, finished a respectable 5th in Division 1. The second team finished a very creditable 4th in Division 2.

As the 1952-53 season got underway it was felt the club and the players were beginning to mature. The hard working committee, who met every Tuesday at the Golden Ball, allegedly to select the teams, had even managed to secure a bus for away games, and both teams had started the season well.

By the end of the season the 1st team finished level on points with Old Blackburnians. Their playing record was . . .

#### P-26 W-21 D-2 L-3 F-96 A-35 Pts-44

Goal difference or goal average was not used as tie breakers in these days and the joint champions had to play off at a neutral venue.

The match report for the play off game reads:

" In a play off at Grimsargh, Broughton Amateurs defeated Old Blackburnians by 2-1 and became champions of the Lancashire Amateur League 1st Division. This performance after only three seasons in top grade amateur soccer is a splendid achievment.

The match was fought at a fast pace throughout and though the exchanges were even Broughton looked the more dangerous and FLINTOFF, always a threat, gave Broughton the lead with a smartly taken goal.

Blackburn equalised almost immediately and at half time the score was 1-1. Early in the second half Blackburn pressed for a period but Broughton's defence was safe.

Eventually EDWARDS gave Broughton the lead and they should have increased that lead but missed easy chances.

The display of Broughton's defenders - RYAN, BLACKWELL, MAWDESLEY and BRIGGS - was first class, and though the forwards were not seen at their best FLINTOFF was ever a source of danger. "

So it was that Broughton won its first trophy by defeating Old Blacks 2-1 at Grimsargh (Fulwood's pitch) in only their 5th season in existence and their 3rd in the LAL. As the report says "a splendid achievement" and one that the club was, quite rightly, very proud of.

After the heady days of the 1952-53 season the next couple of seasons were steady but unspectacular, top four finishes for both teams, so both sides were fairly strong. The next successful season was 1955-56 when the second team won the Division 2 Championship and the first team finished runners up in Division 1. This also gained the club the prestigious Aggregate Trophy, which is awarded to the club whose 1st and 2nd teams collectively achieve the most points. Both these trophies had Broughton Amateurs name on them for the first time.

The club was now almost 10 years old and had become well known and well respected within both the league and more locally. There were several fine players associated with the club around this time, Leo Gornall, a winger with Broughton, was later taken onto PNE's books, and a young Dave Simpson was watched by scouts from both PNE and Blackburn Rovers, Brian Hawkes, who was in the 52-53 team, had joined Broughton after leaving the North End youth team.

Around this time two other young lads made their Broughton debuts, Dave Wilson and Mike Dolphin now currently Chairman and President respectively, thus starting their 40 year association as players and now officials. They have been in these current roles for almost 25 years out of their 40 with the club, and were invaluable committee members before that. All this added to a fine calibre of staff within the club, both on and off the pitch.

The exact date of this picture is not known, only that it was the mid-late fifties and was probably only taken to show off the new changing room and sign.

This hut is now the one we use to store the goal posts, corner flags and nets etc. It was used by two teams who had a tin bath in which to wash after the game and was illuminated by a gas lamp, luxury! Also it was across the A6 and the players had to dodge the traffic before and after the game carrying posts etc.

The sign is still in use, and is kept in the new changing rooms to be hung outside before matches. Just to intimidate the opposition.

At the end of the 1960-61 Season the 1st Team finished Runners-up to Blackpool Rangers. With one game left Blackpool were one point ahead. The last Saturday of the season saw Broughton away at Bolton County and Blackpool round the corner at Old Sladians. Broughton won 5-4 but unfortunately Blackpool won as well to pip us at the post. There was, understandably, a great feeling of anti-climax when the news of Blackpool's win was announced.

Also that season we reached the semi-finals of the Lancashire Amateur Cup but were soundly beaten 4-2 by eventual winners Old Boltonians. The day of the semi was, current Chairman, Dave Wilson's 21st birthday, what a disappointment for him.

Like the 1st team the 2nds finished runners-up also by a solitary point, it was the second year running that they had finished runners-up. All in all a great season but, for both teams, a case of, so near . . . etc. etc.

Sigley, now 39 years and playing as well as ever in his new found position of centre half, he has been with the club since its inception, and was left half and captain of the 1952-3 championship team.

The first team are in second place in the Northern Section, three points behind Old Rivingtonians, whom they beat last Saturday, but with five games in hand. The second team are in fourth place in the Division

II. and the combined records make Broughton firm favourites to take the aggregate trophy from Blackpool Rangers for the first time in six years.

The youngish committee have all been, or still are, playing members, with the exception of the senior member and treasurer Mr. H. Lawton, who played in the League pre-war. Mr. Lawton is one of the original founders of the club, and still maintains his enthusiasm, in spite of the fact that he now lives in St. Annes. The secretary, Mr. Norman Archer is one of those "jeweis" wither, which amateur soccer would not exist, but the greatest debt is owed to the President Mr. Art ur Dickinson, a most generous b nefactor.

# Notable season for Broughton

Broughton Amateurs rounded off a notable season with a 5-4 victory at Bolton C G S O B but, as Blackpool Rangers also won, had to be content with second place, one point behind Blackpool. Broughton put on a grand display to lead 3-1 at the interval athrough goals by Simpson. Smith and one own goal. Simpson and Walker added other goals for Broughton.

Simpson's two goals took his total for the season to 35-good going for a converted wing half. Blackpool Rangers took the championship through greater experience. Broughton, a young side, played brilliantly at times, but under stress have sadly missed a steadying influence.

However, to reach second place in the table and the semi-final of the Lancs Amateur Cup after three seasons third from the bottom, is encoul raging. Broughton's second team also finished runners-up in their division, for the second successive year, when they beat a ten-man Preston G S O B second, 6-1. The goals were scored by Gardner 3, Clark (D.) 2, and Rowland (A.).



In the 1963-64 season the 1sts finished as joint leaders of Division 1 with Preston GS. After needing to win the last five games to draw level on points, still no goal average/difference, so it was a play-off at Whittingham Hospital FC's ground on the Friday evening before the PNE v West Ham FA Cup Final. Brian Hall, who went on to play for Liverpool, before joining Broughton for a spell in the eighties, made an unexpected appearance for Preston, and we were never really in the game. Despite being 1-0 up we were thrashed 4-1 by the end. This coupled with North End's defeat next day made it a quite depressing weekend. Some of our lads, Dave Wilson included, travelled to Wembley to watch the Cup Final, and believe it or not, shared a car with a couple of Preston GS players! Did they rub it in or what?

The 2nd team magnificently won Division 2 and this combined effort from both teams gained the Aggregate Trophy for the club. The third time we had won it.

The 1964-65 season had the highlight of another Lancashire Football Association Cup Semi-final appearance. This time against Quarry Bank (Liverpool) played at Haig Ave (Southport). Against an extremely physical side we were overpowered 5-1 and had little to gain comfort from in the manner of our performance, reportedly our worst ever Semi-Final performance.

1967-68 was the next time Broughton saw a major trophy and it was the 2nd Team Challenge Cup won for the first, and still only, time in the club's existence. For much of the seventies and eighties there was no cup competitions, to alleviate end-of-season fixture congestion. Once again no pictures of the victorious 2nd team cup winners have been located, but, by way of a consolation, below is a picture from 67-68 season of the 1st team before a game against Fulwood. Wonder if they won the match? - Must have!

Out of the swinging Sixties into the decimalised Seventies. Off the pitch the seventies saw some major losses, the early part of the decade met with the passing on of Hayden Sigley and Harry Lawton and in 1979 the tragic loss of Norman Archer. The club donated the Norman Archer Trophy to the league and Harry's widow donated a trophy to the club which is presented each season to the Clubman of the Year helping to stimulate their memory to us all. They are all still remembered by us and sadly missed. In football terms they contributed to make the Seventies the start of Broughton's rise to the top.

On the pitch there was a spectacular start to the decade when in 1971-72 the first team won the Second Division championship and the LAL Cup for the first time. Another memorable feat. Sadly no team photos have been located, but we're still looking. Can you help?

All that has been found is this news report about a friendly game, against Tommy Thompson's All Star XI played at Willow Farm, sometime during the 71-72 season and which included most of the double winning squad in a match that Broughton won 4-1 against a team of ex-professionals.

The following year (1972-73) saw the introduction of a Third team, the reasons given for the formation of a third team varied. One school of thought, mainly round the bar, was that it was formed to prolong the career of veterans, but officially it was to promote a club policy of developing youth alongside experience. Many have benefitted from this policy as will be seen in the team photos, with younger players in lower teams one year then progressing upwards in subsequent years. Many made the reverse trip in later seasons.

However the next major effect on the club was perpetrated by the league themselves when the structure of the Lancashire Amateur League was re-organised for the 1974-75 season. Previously the league was regionalised, North, South and Central. In 74-75 the league was totally united by the formation of a Premier, First, Second and Third divisions. Broughton was placed in the First Division as was the second team in their identical (reserves) structure. The thirds were placed in the Northern Section Division 3B, (still regionalised for lower teams). This meant that none of our three teams were in the top flight of their section, we had no say in this decision, but the club was not too concerned because it was felt this would make team building easier than it would in the premier divisions.

In the first year of the new structure, 74-75, the third team, pictured below, got the Broughton trophy winning machine into a groove that was to last till 87-88 (14/15 seasons) and capture 36 major honours in that most glorious spell for the club.

Norman Archer was 3rd team manager as they ended as champions of 3B North, no less, with a mix of youth (Andy Rostron, Kim Taylor, Stu Blackwell) and experience (Henry Clark, Alan Rowlands, captain Alan Whittaker), all the others must have come somewhere in between, this confirmed that the policy mentioned earlier worked and was the way ahead.

Incidently Stuart Blackwell is the son of Eric Blackwell a player in the first championship team of 52/53 and Stuart's son is signing for the club in 97 to become the third generation Blackwell to play for Broughton, if he wins a championship one day, that would be even more unique.

With the 3rd team safely promoted to division 3A, the next season, 75-76, saw the 1st team make its first significant move in the new structure when it won the first division championship and therefore was promoted into the premier division where they stayed for the next 20 seasons. Below is the squad that won the league, including long serving player Dave Simpson and members of the selection committe.

When the 2nd team manager, Derek Phillips, saw his side, pictured below, promoted as champions of Division 1 (Reserves) in 76-77 this should have meant that all our teams were now in the top flight of their sections, except that this season had seen the introduction of a 4th team into Division 3C, must have been a lot of vets unable to get a game in the 3rds, who are pictured on next page. It isn't really suprising they were unable to get into the 3rd team as they were winning their division, 3A, for the first time in a run that saw them repeat this achievement and become champions for six consecutive seasons. Not to be totally outdone the newly formed 4th team, managed promotion to Division 3B. A great achievement in their very first season.

The establishment of the 4th team, part of the master plan, highlighted how much effort the committee, led by Dave Wilson, put into the club, people like Norman Archer, who was not only secretary, since 1956, but assisted in running both the 3rd AND 4th teams with help from captains, Brian Craven and Alan Whitaker.

As mentioned earlier Derek Phillips and captain Malcolm Forsyth ran the 2nd team, whilst the 1st team was run by a committee including Dave Wilson, Mike Dolphin and captain Bob Greenslade, who was in his final season with the club.

The Seventies had seen the Club lease the 'field' belonging to Park House (Mike Dolphin, house resident - Club president) and construct a new pitch there as well as re-developing the existing pitch. With two matches at Broughton most weeks we also had to improve changing facilities, these showers etc. were constructed on the end of the Playgroup/Youth Club hut.

At the start of 1980-81 season the teams were using the new facilities and in Oct 1980 we had an official opening, which was performed by Ruth Archer, seen on the opposite page cutting the red tape and then the cake at the reception afterwards, with Chairman Dave Wilson looking on.

A quick word on Ruth. Wife of the late Norman Archer, pictures of him on previous pages, not only supported him during his service to the Club, but actively helped him and the Club. In 1951 (or was it 52) in order to save the Club money she agreed to wash the kit, and guess what? some 45 (or is it 46) years later she is still doing it. At times, particularly when we had 5 teams, she has had help, from Jill Rowland and Ann Aquilina to name but two of those helpers. The kits are picked up Saturday lunch and dropped off Saturday tea-time. Pass her house anytime and there will be a set of shirts on the line drying. In addition, to kit washing and maintenance, on Saturday afternoons while the kit is getting muddied and bloodied, she goes up to Broughton to brew up for the players and their opponents.

Interestingly, she never actually played for the club but probably would have done better than some who did, and EVERY generation of players at Broughton owe her a great vote thanks, and she deserves this recognition, and more, for all she has done through the years.

We were truly in the middle of a golden era for the club, however if one season stood out amongst the rest, if there was one season when we won more trophies than any other, then surely this 1980-81 season was that special one. It most certainly had to be the pinnacle of all the club's achievements we won every trophy, except one, that was available to us. This one season could fill a whole book, the records could keep any 'Statto' happy for weeks, and it would be easy to wax lyrically about the amazing successes of that season. So here goes.

Pride of place, undoubtedly, went to the first team, winning the two main competitons that they had entered, these were the Premier Division of the Lancashire Amateur League, won for the first time since its inception, and also the Lancashire Amateur Cup which is the major competition for amateur clubs in the county a sort of European Cup, it was our first appearance in the final, after previously being four times in the semis, below is that successful team.

The league season for the 1st team did not start that spectacularly after 10 games they had won 4, only lost 1, but drawn 5 so they were well placed but were drawing too many to be threatening the early pacesetters, Rossendale and Burnley Belvedere. The main thing here was that because of only the one defeat, 2-1 away at Rossendale, there was an air of quiet confidence within the squad and a final sequence of twenty points from eleven games, two points for a win in those days, saw them home by a healthy six point margin. Winning the league is a great acheivement, after all it's your "bread and butter", proving you are the best over a season is tremendously satisfying, it is the ultimate test and the main yardstick for gauging ability of clubs or teams, BUT, there is nothing like the 'magic' of the cup.

The expectation and excitement mounts as the rounds go by till you reach the crescendo of a Final. Here, briefly, is how the momentous cup run of 1980-81 unfolded.

When we beat the well respected and fancied Wythenshawe, 2-1 away in the second round it signalled our intent as serious contenders. Next, in our only Cup tie at home, Manchester YMCA were beaten 5-2. Then in the fourth round, away at Rochdale, we had a convincing 3-1 win. Burnley Belvedere were dispatched 2-0, again away from home, in the quarter finals. That left us, alongside three Liverpool Zingari league teams. Sefton and District beat St. Dominics 4-2 in the first semi and we were drawn to meet Mossley Hill in the other Semi-Final at Burscough on 19th March. There was certainly a buzz within the club as it was firmly gripped by cup fever.

Our generous president allowed the players to be pampered at 'his' restuarant, Guys, before the big game and the players enjoyed it so much, a 0-0 draw, after extra time, in a game we should have won, meant they had to do it all over again on the 27th, this time after Guys we went to play at Marine's ground, where we won convincingly 3-0 with goals from Dave Gornall (2) and Eddie Shorrock. Dave should have had a hat trick but missed a penalty in the last few minutes.

Still, as a club, we were all happy enough. That was the fifth time in the Club's history that it had made it to the LFA Cup Semi-Final stage and at last we had won through to the Final.

So, confidently onto the Final, to be held at Burscough on Thursday 9th April 1981, against Sefton. Once again our magnanimous president made sure we were well prepared, at Guys. These pre-match meetings were tremendous for team spirit and after our 'light' meal Eddie Brown would address the squad and, as only he can, would relax, motivate and inspire us. This evening he surpassed even himself with his own performance. As in his own style he went through the team player-by-player in such an entertaining manner we forgot there was a match to play, but his brilliant style was such that, although humorous, the point always hit home.

We were prepared, all that was left now was to play. A couple of coachloads of supporters plus a convoy of cars left from Fulwood and Broughton Cricket Club.

The press cutting, on the facing page, will describe the game to you through neutral eyes, but everyone agreed we deserved our 3-2 victory. Gornall, Shorrock and Taylor scored the goals.

To try and put this achievement in context, it was the first time since the war that a Preston team had won this trophy, a gap of 43 years, this most prestigious of amateur competitions, was started in 1893, it was our 'European' Cup and the Club's finest hour.

The page opposite shows the newpaper report with the match programme and a picture of the players and supporters celebrating after being presented with the cup and their individual winners trophies.

Broughton came out de-terminedly in the second half and after ten minutes they regained the lead with a goal from Eddie Shorrock.



1983-84 had the 2nd Team, pictured below, back to winning ways, when under the management of veteran (and future secretary) Gordon Owen, they regained the Premier Division (Reserves) title.

The 4th Team won the Frank Aubert Trophy once more and the 1sts and 3rds had top four placings.

The 1st Team did reach the final of the LFA Cup. In an eventful competition which saw them beat two Zingari League (liverpool) teams, two fellow LAL teams and in the Semi Final at Liseux they defeated Blackpool Rangers, who were once in the LAL but are now in the West Lancsashire League, 2-1 after extra time.

The final was delayed as oponents, Mersyside Police, had officers missing they were on duty policing the disturbances caused by the current miners strike. When the match was finally played on 25th April 1984 at Leyland Motors FC, we had players missing, and it showed. In a poor game we were beaten 1-0 but neither side dominated. It was a dissappointing end to the season.

The Glory years continued when in 1984-85 the 2nds won the Premier (Reserves) for the sixth time in seven seasons, a magnificent run, no photo has been found of this seasons championship team. The 4th team won the Frank Aubert Trophy and the 3rds were in the top four again. The 1st Team finished in runners-up spot to Bury Amateurs.

In 1985-86 the first team made a bit more history as they won the League Cup for the first time ever when they beat Bury Ams 3-1 at Fulwood. The goals were scored by Dave Mathers, Keith Pomfret and Pete Woodruff, in addition to this they finished third in the league. The 2nd team won the Premier (Res) for their last time, the seventh in eight glorious years. Once again no photos available for either of these triumphs.

In 1986-87 the1sts finished runners-up and the 3rd Team, pictured below, regained the Division 3A title. The other three teams were also well placed and this won the Norman Archer Trophy for the Club.

By now we had a 5th Team and in 1987-88 they won their only championship, when player manager Ted Harmer guided them to the Division 3C title. Meanwhile the 4ths were winning the Frank Aubert Trophy for their last time.

Broughton had many dramatic end-of-season run-ins, hopefully covered somewhere in this booklet, some ended in joyous elation, some in despair and abject misery. The climax of the 1988-89 season certainly caused us a lot of grief. From a mid-table position with ten games left we went on one of those late Broughton bursts, that brought us 17 out of 18 points and put us one point clear of Moston with one game left, and that was against Moston at home. We lost 1-0 after a dubious, and hotly disputed, penalty gave Moston the two points required to clinch top spot.

All this in the same season as our chairman, Dave Wilson, was in office as league President. How fitting it would have been for him to present the Premier Trophy to his own club at the League Dinner. Sadly it didn't turn out that way.

What about Dave Wilson? No book, or even mention, of Broughton should be contemplated without also refering to Dave Wilson. Player during the fifties and sixties, committee member from his early days with the club and finally Chairman. He was presented with the Long Service to Football Award in the early eighties, as was Alan Rowland, for their service not only to Broughton but the League and therefore football in general. Then in 1988 he was elected President of the Lancashire Amateur League, an honour not bestowed on many. With the support of his wife, Carol, he has been with the Club 40 years and is the main guiding influence and motivator for all the players and supporters. He is the solid foundation and rock around which the Club continues to build. Since his retirement, early he will tell you, he has spent many hours per week, with Eddie Brown, tending to the pitches, because of these efforts the 'mud baths' of the seventies are no more and the pitches are a credit to his and Eddie's efforts. Gavin Clinch and Alan Rowland have also been involved with the extensive work on the pitches and our thanks must be extended to all these volunteers for their fine work.

During the eighties the club was invited by the Preston Referees Society to take part in the Jack Kelly Memorial Cup competition. Which was organised in Jack's memory by his refereeing colleagues in Preston. The competition brings Preston's finest amateur teams together, from all leagues. We reached the Final in 1984-85 and 1985-86 only to be beaten by Longridge and then Liseux. It was our third appearance in the Final, 1986-87, when we at last won the cup beating top Sunday League outfit Ingol Rangers 2-1 at Deepdale.

Why were we so successful during all these years?

One of Eddie Brown's favourite theories is that if you socialise as a team you will play football as team. Happy together off the pitch therefore happy together on it. The social scene was certainly vibrant, as one B.A.N.T.E.R. of the time stated "we have more social events than football matches . . . . playing for Broughton is as much fun off the field as on it." BANTER, by the way, is an acronym standing for (Broughton Amateurs, News, Tables, Events, Reports) and is the club's newsletter. To give you an idea of how busy the social committee were, one season saw, A Ladies Evening, Cheese and Wine Party, Hoe Down, Childrens Xmas Party, Christmas Dinner, Valentines Buffet, League Dinner and Club Presentation, when did we find time to play football.

The playing fortunes of the teams have dipped during the nineties, but this season, 1996-97, has seen an upturn in league positions for all our teams, and we hope this consolidation will give us the stability to climb back up the leagues.

Currently the 1st Team, managed by Ken Hesketh, are in the top half of their division, as are the 2nd Team, who are managed by Steve Sergeant. The 3rd Team, run by Eddie Brown and Dave Wilson, are setting the standards by sitting proudly on top of their division, having only lost once so far this season, while the 4ths, in the same division as the 3rds, and run by Rick and Steve Aquilina, are mid-way. All the teams are holding their own.

We even have a veterans team, run by Trev Lafferty, who were unbeaten in last years competition, but were eliminated on goal difference, and are looking forward to having another go this year.

So the future is bright, we also have an affiliation with top junior club Cadley Boys, having already received some of their ex-players in recent years, we look forward to many more making the transition from junior to senior soccer.

#### Well that's it folks !

Hope you've enjoyed this, for what it is, a cheap and cheerful look at Broughton Amateurs through the ages, sorry about all the typographical erors, wong names, spilling mistakes, people missed, events forgotten and all the other errors, but it is only meant to stimulate, or maybe inspire you, to continue your association proudly with the best club in the area . . .
